# Chairman's Statement

In the year 2017/18, we entered into the 2<sup>nd</sup> year under our five year Strategic Plan cycle. It was a year that reminded us of the importance of strong values and culture which were vital to our customers, shareholders, stakeholders and the entire County of Nyeri and also our great Country at large. Our strategy remains robust and we continue to execute our mandate to provide water and sanitation services in line with the license conditions of the Water Services Regulatory Board (WASREB) as a delegated and devolved function of the County Government of Nyeri.

# Performance and Operating Environment

Over the last year, we extended our services to areas beyond our original area of service in Mathira West, Kieni East and Tetu Sub Counties. We also continue to forge stable and long term relationships with our willing development partners and Government in order to enrich our level of services to not only meet but strive to exceed customer expectations.

We are well aware of the many challenges and opportunities in the water services subsector and are continually improving on our commitment to innovation and new technology to enhance our services to our customers. Our ambition is to continue leading the sector's results on best management approaches to reduce Non Revenue Water (NRW) levels, enhance customer service, and project management including Operations and maintenance.

This progressive approaches helped us achieve tremendous results in the year 2017/18 despite of the numerous challenges encountered especially on the economic environment in the Country. In this regard, we continued to improve the balance sheet by 7% in net worth and grew our revenues by 8%. We continued to ensure minimum water losses within our water pipeline network and comfortably closed the year with a Non-Revenue Water level of below the 20% thus maintaining the regulatory requirements by the end of the financial year under consideration, the NRW was 14.3% compared to 17.59%.

The Company's successful performance is founded on the way it carries out its business founded on robust corporate values, including a clear commitment to serve its customers and society at large. We foster inclusivity and our presence in the areas we serve present a stable and reliable service that can be depended upon by all. We continue to work closely with partners in both the private and public sector to improve livelihood through our Corporate Social Responsibility programmes to actively uplift the living standards of the vulnerable members of our community. During the year we actively took part and supported the following organizations:

- 1. Huruma Child Support Network, Ramadhan IFTAR Festivals, World Aids Day, National Council for People with Disability
- 2. Nyeri Hospice Walk, County Referral Pediatric Ward and Action for Orphans by Saint Joseph CBO, Mater Heart Run, Kenya Red Cross

Once again, I am humbled and delighted to report that the Company's performance culture in the sector continued to be maintained and the Water Services Regulatory rating placed the Company as the top ranked water utility in Kenya for the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> years' consecutively in the Impact Issue No.10 of 2018. Overall the company scooped six out of the seven awards considered on the key performance indicators:-

- 1. Best Overall
- 2. Best performing utility in Governance
- 3. Best performing utility in NRW
- 4. Best utility in pro-poor services
- 5. Top utility in very large category and
- 6. Best utility in Tana Water Services Board region

Our successes cannot be explained without the contribution and fantastic performance of our workforce. We have a great team which shares the Company's vision, mission and values. We therefore endeavor to invest continually in their career and professional development through sponsorship for seminars, workshops and short term training. Their commitment makes us optimistic and gives us the zeal that is required to provide guidance as a Board so that we can continue leading the Company to attain our aspiration.

The management has spent valuable time to institute necessary changes in the operational systems and meet our customers to understand what they expect from us. They have also taken the opportunity to engage with our customers facing the employees in order to see customers through their eyes and make sure that they understand what they experience on a day to day basis. Through the regular reporting done by top management and our active engagement with them, we as a Board are able to ensure the fulfilment of our customers' needs which are reflected in the governance decisions we make for the Company. In this respect, I am happy to report that the Company introduced an interactive Customer Service Management System (Majivoice), positively embraced cashless payment of bills system where customers pay their bills through our appointed agencies: Safaricom – Mpesa platform, Equity Bank, Family Bank and Eco Bank and the Nyewasco mobile portal.

The Company successfully commenced the Sewer extension projects financed by the Cooperative Bank of Kenya through the Commercial financing programme of the World Bank's Results Based Finance concept of Output Based Aid (OBA) spearheaded by the Water Sector Trust Fund. The projects are expected to be completed in the first quarter of the next financial year and we are confident that the Company will qualify for 60% subsidy for timely completion of the projects. These projects will go a long way into improving the sanitation level and accelerated growth in the earmarked areas of Nyeri town i.e. King'ong'o – Gatende Estate, Kamakwa – Kandara Estate, Ngangaritrhi – Classic Estates and Ruring'u – Skuta Estates. Other major improvement projects have also been proposed for funding by our development partners to extend water and sewer services.

As Chairman, I continue to stress the need for nurturing genuinely customer focused culture whose approach is based on the interest of the people we are called upon to serve and for the best interests of the shareholders – the County Government of Nyeri. In this respect, the Board stands firm in its commitment to execute on its responsibility to boldly tackle the conduct and governance issues in order to successfully address and deliver to our customers, shareholders and employees by observing merit and ensuring

that we have a range of skills and competencies among the members of the Board and top management to support achievement of the strategy.

#### **Future Outlook**

The year was very challenging given the prolonged electioneering period and the company was not able to implement the approved new tariffs. However, given that the period had weathered out, we are happy to note and appreciate the support accorded to the Company by the new administration of the County Government of Nyeri. For this reason, there is conducive working environment and with this positive effect of political goodwill, we are hopeful that the Company will continue to perform well and experience growth into the future as we remain optimistic that the worst is behind us and the future presents enormous opportunities as the world becomes integrated as a global village. For the last three years, we have heavily invested in restructuring the company by bringing on board an energetic management team, improving on technology and strengthening systems and it is therefore time to scale up our operations to realize maximum returns to all our stakeholders.

I wish to extend my sincere gratitude to all our esteemed customers, shareholders, development and business partners, my colleagues in the Board, the Executive Management team and our employees for their unwavering support and confidence in the Company.

# The Managing Director's Statement

I am delighted to present to you the Nyeri Water and Sewerage Company (NYEWASCO) Annual Report and Financial Statements for the year ended 30<sup>th</sup> June 2018. It gives me great pleasure yet again to report that NYEWASCO has recorded another year of impressive financial performance. This demonstrates that the company is healthy with a growing demand for its services in the neighbouring service areas whose capacity to contribute substantial gains to the County of Nyeri economy through our core mandate of providing water and sanitation services.

The robust performance has been driven by prudent financial management, dedicated staff and effective guidance from the Board of Directors. We partnered with our customers and other stakeholders to become more customer focused and more efficient in our operations to ensure security of the water supply and sewerage services to the people of Nyeri town sub county and those in the neighbouring sub counties. In 2017/18, our dedication to operational excellence yielded a strong set of financial results. The following are some of our critical highlights of the key performance indicators that capture the year under review:-

#### FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

The Company posted a 14.89% growth in Pre-Tax profit to Kshs. 64,396,664 for the financial year ended 30<sup>th</sup> June 2018 compared to Kshs. 54,809,424 in FY 2016/17.

#### Throughput

During the period under review, the Company recorded a significant growth in Water and Sewer billings where 6,546,318m³ and 1,571,440m³ produced and treated was sold compared to 6,366,328m³ and 1,384,464m³ in FY 2016/17. This is equivalent to a growth of 2.8% and 13.5% respectively. Further, the water and sewer active connections increased to 28024 and 7906 in 2017/18 from 27436 and 7586 in the previous year representing a growth of 2% and 4% respectively.

# Revenue

The revenue increased to Kshs. 453,552,645 comprising of Kshs. 329,265,209 and Kshs.124,287,436 for water and sewer billings in the year under review from Kshs.417,836,715 comprising of Kshs.303,889,246 and Kshs.113,947,469 water and sewer billings recorded in FY 2016/17, equivalent to a 8% increase. In addition, there was other income generated from various sources that declined slightly to Kshs.11,003,745 in the year under review from Kshs. 11,589,195 in FY 2016/17 representing a 5% decrease.

#### **Operating Expenditure**

While the Company operated within the budgeted expenditure during the year, total operating expenditure increased by 7.27% to Kshs.407,860,365 from the previous year's Kshs.378,201,964. The increase in the operating expenditure is attributable to

escalation of prices for most of the commodities used in operations and the increase in staff cost due to annual salary adjustments to cushion for increase in cost of living. It is also important to note that despite the expected implementation of new tariffs the company was not able to charge the tariff due to the long electioneering season.

There was also a significant reduction in Board of Directors expenses since the scheduled Board tour was postponed to the following year. In addition the company accrued the payment of the Tana Water Services Board Administration fees later in the year because there was an advisory circular No.1 from the Water Services Regulatory Board Ref: WASREB/LEGAL/582 VOL.IV/(32) of 6<sup>th</sup> June 2017 which advised the Water Service Providers to accrue the licensee administration fee until 1<sup>st</sup> July 2017. However, the advisory was later retracted through advisory circular No. 2 Ref: WASREB/LEGAL/582VOL.IV(34) dated 2<sup>nd</sup> August, 2017 which advised that the Administration fee shall continue to be money due to the Water Services Board until consultations between WASREB, Ministry of Water & Sanitation and the County Governments are concluded on the use of the fees after July 2017. In addition, the lease fee payable to the County Government was also not accrued because the lease agreement between the defunct Municipal Council of Nyeri subsumed by the County Government of Nyeri expired in December 2015 and had not been renewed.

# **Financial Position**

The Company closed with Cash reserves in form of Fixed deposit and also Cash and Cash Equivalents of Kshs.134,129,154 and Kshs.53.563,707 compared to Kshs. 142,069,591 and Kshs.27,347,561 respectively in the previous year. This strong financial position and robust Cashflow will support the planned capacity enhancement projects for water and sewerage extensions to unserved areas neighbouring the official service area of the Company. The Company met all its statutory obligations during the year under review.

# KEY CAPITAL PROJECTS

During the year under review, the Company laid firm measures for the implementation of key capital projects whose status is given below:-

# 1. Completion of Rwanyaga Water Extension Project

This project was commenced in the previous FY and was completed in August 2017. The project covers parts of Mathira West Sub-County and was requested by the customers in the target area who were neighbouring areas that were already benefiting from water services by the Company. The project covered a total length of 12 kilometers and construction of a masonry tank with a capacity of 2253. Currently, 163 customers have been connected with water and are enjoying the services on a 24/7 supply.

# 2. Upgrading of KCC - Chaka transmission main pipeline

This is 3 inch pipeline which was upgraded to a 6 inch pipeline measuring approximately 2.5 kilometers. The upgrade was prioritized on account of the increased demand for water services in Chaka town and the adjacent areas including Brooke side, Mount Kenya area, Milimani and Karundas.

# 3. Upgrading of Kihuyo – Mweiga transmission Main pipeline

The area covered used to experience frequent bursts along the main pipeline resulting to massive water losses i.e. high Non Revenue Water levels. The Company therefore embarked on upgrading the critical sections covering a length of 2 kilometers since the

allocated budget for upgrades was not sufficient to cover the entire 6 kilometers. In this regard, the existing pipeline capacity was increased from 4 inch to 6 inch for a distance of 1.2 kilometers and the class of pipes used was changed from UPVC PN10 to HDPE PN16.

# 4. Sewer Extension Project under the Results Based Financing Concept

In February 2018, the Company commenced construction of the new sewer extension project financed through the Output Based Aid (OBA) programme by the Water Sector Trust Fund (WSTF) and supported by the World Bank Group. The commercial financing was financed by the Co-operative Bank of Kenya to the tune of Kshs.194,249,348. The scope of the project covers the following areas:-

- (a.) King'ong'o Gatende Estate (Lot I) Kshs.70,671,436.01
- (b.) Ruring'u Skuta Estate (Lot II) Kshs.35,369,771.33
- (c.) Kamakwa Kandara Estate (Lot III) Kshs.57,276,814.18
- (d.) Classic Ngangarithi Estate (Lot IV) Kshs.30,931,326.80

The loan disbursement is based on the accomplished certified works.

Upon completion of the project and achievement of the agreed milestones, the project is expected to result to an additional 2,906 sewer connections and benefit a population of approximately 14,530. In addition, the Company will benefit from 60% subsidy from the World Bank and substantially increase the sewer revenue which is projected to be over Kshs. 3,000,000 per month.

# 5. Other Minor Capital Projects

The Company also undertook various minor extensions of both water and sewer networks and procured other assets as summarized below:-

- (a.) Improvement of existing pipelines and rehabilitation of reservoir and tanks.
- (b.) Sewer extension
- (c.) Motor Vehicles and Motor Cycles.
- (d.) Computer hardware, printers and accessories including new software
- (e.) Laboratory and Electromechanical equipment

# Appreciation

Let me conclude by thanking our Shareholders – the County Government of Nyeri, Ministry of Water and Sanitation and its State Corporations i.e. Water Sector Trust Fund. Water Services Regulatory Board and Tana Water Services Board for their distinguished role in helping us achieve this success. I would also like to appreciate the Chairman and the Board of Directors for the support and guidance they provided to the Management throughout the year. To our customers, it is a big thank you for choosing to maintain your confidence with us and certainly without your support these results could not have been possible.

Finally, I wish to sincere thank all the NYEWASCO staff for working tirelessly to deliver this great performance.

# REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

# **Opinion**

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Nyeri Water and Sewerage Company Limited set out on pages 16 to 33, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2018, and the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity, statement of cash flows and statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information in accordance with the provisions of Article 229 of the Constitution of Kenya and Section 35 of the Public Audit Act, 2015. I have obtained all the information and explanations which, to the best of my knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of the audit.

In my opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Nyeri Water and Sewerage Company Limited as at 30 June 2018, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards, and comply with both the Water Act, 2002 and the Kenyan Companies Act, 2015.

# **Basis for Opinion**

The audit was conducted in accordance with International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). I am independent of Nyeri Water and Sewerage Company Limited in accordance with ISSAI 30 on Code of Ethics. I have fulfilled other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the ISSAI and in accordance with other ethical requirements applicable to performing audits of financial statements in Kenya. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

# **Key Audit Matters**

Key audit matters are those matters that, in my professional judgment, are of most significance in the audit of the financial statements. Except for the matter described in the Basis for Conclusions on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in use of Public Resources section, I have determined that there are no key audit matters to communicate in my report.

#### Other Information

The directors are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the report of directors as required by the Companies Act, 2015, and the statement of the

directors' responsibilities which are obtained prior to the date of this report, and the annual report which is expected to be made available after that date.

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and I do not express an audit opinion or any form of assurance thereon.

In connection with the audit of the financial statements, my responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or the knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. Based on the work I have performed on the other information obtained prior to the date of this auditor's report, if I conclude that there is material misstatement of this other information, I am required to report that fact. I have nothing to report in this regard.

# Conclusion

As required by Article 229(6) of the Constitution, based on the audit procedures performed, except for the matters described in the Basis for Conclusions on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in Use of Public Resources section of my report, I confirm that, nothing else has come to my attention to cause me to believe that public resources have not been applied lawfully and in an effective way.

# **Basis for Conclusion**

# **Unpaid Lease Fees**

Trade and other payables disclosed under Note 22 to the financial statements includes payables totalling Kshs.133,464,261. As previously reported, included in the payables balance are lease fee and board administration fee payables of Kshs.34,284,671 and Kshs.45,205,838, respectively. The unpaid board administrative fees relate to unremitted lease fees owed to Tana Water Services Board. However, the Company deposits the unpaid lease fees in a special account under instruction from the County Government of Nyeri, although the practice is not supported by relevant legislation.

The audit was conducted in accordance with ISSAI 4000. The standard requires that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain assurance about whether the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements are in compliance, in all material respects, with the authorities that govern them. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my conclusion.



# REPORT ON EFFECTIVENESS OF INTERNAL CONTROLS, RISK MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE

#### Conclusion

As required by Section 7(1)(a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015, based on the audit procedures performed, except for the matters described in the Basis for Conclusion on Lawfulness and Effectiveness in Use of Public Resources section of my report, I confirm that, nothing else has come to my attention to cause me to believe that internal controls, risk management and governance were not effective.

The audit was conducted in accordance with ISSAI 1315 and ISSAI 1330. The standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain assurance about whether processes and systems of internal control, risk management and governance were operating effectively, in all material respects. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my conclusion.

# REPORT ON OTHER LEGAL AND REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS

As required by the Kenyan Companies Act, 2015 I report based on the audit, that:

- (i) I have obtained all the information and explanations which, to the best of my knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of my audit;
- (ii) In my opinion, proper books of account have been kept by the Company, so far as appears from the examination of those books;
- (iii) The Company's statement of financial position and statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income are in agreement with books of account; and
- (iv) In my opinion the information given in the report of the directors on page 7, is consistent with the financial statements.

# Responsibilities of Directors and Those Charged with Governance

The directors are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards and the requirements of the Kenyan Companies Act, and for maintaining effective internal control as the directors determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error and for assessment of the effectiveness of internal control, risk management and governance.

In preparing the financial statements, the directors are responsible for assessing the ability of Nyeri Water and Sanitation Company Limited to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the directors either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so

The directors are also responsible for the submission of the financial statements to the Auditor-General in accordance with the provisions of Section 47 of the Public Audit Act, 2015.

In addition to the responsibility for the preparation and presentation of the financial statements described above, the directors are also responsible for ensuring that the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements are in compliance with the authorities which govern them, and that public resources are applied in an effective way.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the financial reporting process, reviewing the effectiveness of how the entity monitors compliance with relevant legislative and regulatory requirements, ensuring that effective processes and systems are in place to address key roles and responsibilities in relation to governance and risk management, and ensuring the adequacy and effectiveness of the control environment.

# Auditor-General's Responsibilities for the Audit

The audit objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion in accordance with the provisions of Section 48 of the Public Audit Act, 2015 and submit the audit report in compliance with Article 229(7) of the Constitution. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISSAIs will always detect a material misstatement and weakness when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

In addition to the audit of the financial statements, a compliance audit is planned and performed to express a conclusion about whether, in all material respects, the activities, financial transactions and information reflected in the financial statements are in compliance with the authorities that govern them and that public resources are applied in

an effective way, in accordance with the provisions of Article 229(6) of the Constitution and submit the audit report in compliance with Article 229(7) of the Constitution.

Further, in planning and performing the audit of the financial statements and audit of compliance, I consider internal control in order to give an assurance on the effectiveness of internal controls, risk management and governance processes and systems in accordance with the provisions of Section 7(1) (a) of the Public Audit Act, 2015 and submit the audit report in compliance with Article 229(7) of the Constitution. My consideration of the internal control would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control that might be material weaknesses under the ISSAIs. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements caused by error or fraud in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions.

Because of its inherent limitations, internal control may not prevent or detect misstatements and instances of non-compliance. Also, projections of any evaluation of effectiveness to future periods are subject to the risk that controls may become inadequate because of changes in conditions, or that the degree of compliance with the policies and procedures may deteriorate.

As part of an audit conducted in accordance with ISSAIs, I exercise professional judgement and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the directors.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the directors' use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of Nyeri Water and Sanitation Company Limited to continue as a going concern. If I

conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in the auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my audit report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Company to cease as a going concern.

- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.
- Obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the financial information and business activities of Nyeri Water and Sanitation Company Limited to express an opinion on the financial statements.
- Perform such other procedures as I consider necessary in the circumstances.

I communicate with the directors regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that are identified during the audit.

I also provide the directors with a statement that I have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on my independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.

# Explanatory Notes: Expenditure

- The Performance difference of (-)12% Administration expenses was due to Bad & Doubtiful debt provision of Kshs. 5,692,233 and also provision for staff leave days which was Kshs. 1,250,646.23. 5 6 <del>C</del> 6 F
  - The Board of Directors expenditure was maintained within the budget and regulatory guidelines.
  - Accrual for Kshs. 21,148,095.96 and 20, 973,951.00 has been made in the accounts in respect of Water Service Board fee and County Government lease fee respectively. The Performance difference of (-)9.6% Operations expenses was mainly due to price escalation on various operations/maintenace items.
- No provision for corporate Tax has been made since the company is still carying forward a taxable loss as a result of Capital Deductions claimed on Nyeri Water Extension Project. However given the fact that more capital projects are now being implemented further capital deductions may be claimed once they are completed leading to more taxable losses.

NB: The Tax Appeal Tribunal is yet to make a ruling on the V.A.T Tax dispute of Kshs. 35,384,476.00 and hence no refunds have been made yet by K.R.A. The claims receivable is Kshs. 44,956,787.31



# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH JUNE 2018

#### 1 GENERAL INFORMATION

Nyewasco was established as a limited liability company on 23rd September 1997and in compliance with the water act of 2016. Its main mandate is to provide high quality water and sewerage to the people of Nyeri sub county and it's environs. The company has a function structure, headed by the managing director who leads a management team of heads of departments.

# 2 STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE AND BASIS OF PREPARATION

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below:

#### a) Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared on the historical cost basis and in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS)

#### b) Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that its economic benefits will flow to the company and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue from provision of water and sewerage is recognized when these services are delivered to customers and billed by the company.

#### c) Capital Development Project

With the assistance of the Government of the Republic of Kenya and the Kreditanstalt für Wiederaufbau (KfW), of the Federal Republic of Germany, the company embarked on a Rehabilitation and Extension of Water and Sewerage services. The project has now been completed.

#### d) Property, Plant & Equipment

Property, Plant & Equipment are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation and any impairment in value.

The cost of laying new pipes, installing new meters, replacing old pipes and meters is capitalised under plant and machinery.

# e) Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated on the reducing balance basis, at annual rates estimated to write off carrying values of the assets over their expected useful lives. The annual depreciation rates in use are:

#### f) Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is determined on the last cost basis. Net Realizable Value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of the business less estimated costs of completion and costs necessary to make the sale.

# g) Deferred Taxation

No deferred taxation is provided as there are no timing differences.

#### h) Lease Charges

Operating lease charges are charged to profit and loss account on the accrual basis.



# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH JUNE 2018 (CONT'D)

#### i) Retirement Benefits

The company operates a defined contribution scheme. The scheme is open to employees who qualify as Local Government Officers and is funded from contributions by both the company and employees. Employees who are not members of the Kenya Local Government Officers Super-annuation Fund are members of the National Social Security Fund, a statutory pension scheme. The company's contributions to the schemes are charged to the income statement I the year to which they relate.

The company has also established a contributory Staff Retirement Benefit and Life Assurance Scheme.

The assets of this scheme are held in a separate Trustee administered fund in compliance with Retirement Benefit Authority Regulations.

#### j) Provision for Staff Leave Entitlement

A provision is made to recognise staff entitlement in respect of annual leave not taken as at the end of the financial year. The monetary liability for employees' accrued annual leave entitlement at the balance sheet date is recognized as an expense accrual.

#### k) Foreign Currency

Transactions during the year in foreign currency are converted into Kenya shillings at rates ruling at the transaction date. Assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currency are translated into Kenya Shillings at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date.

#### I) Trade Receivables

Accounts receivable are stated at their nominal value and reduced by appropriate allowances for estimated irrecoverable amounts.

# m) Trade Payables

Trade payables are stated at their nominal value.

#### n) Amortisation of Capital Grant

Grants received for capital assets are credited to the capital grant account net of armotisation which is released to the income statement over the life of the relevant assets.

#### o) Fair Statement of Trade Receivables

General provisions are made based on the management's evaluation of the trade receivables' balance and other exposures in respect of losses, which although not specifically identified, are known from experience to be present in the trade receivables balance.

Bad debts are written off when all reasonable steps to recover them have been taken without success.

#### p) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank, in hand and short term deposits with a maturity of 3 months or less.

For purpose of the cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents comprise of cash and cash equivalents as defined above, net of outstanding bank overdrafts.

#### q) Reserves

Surpluses / (Deficits) from income statement are accumulated in the reserve account.



# NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH JUNE 2018 (CONT'D)

#### s)

Provisions are recognized when the company has a legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate of the amount can be made.

Where the company expects a provision to be reimbursed, for example under insurance, the reimbursement is recognized as a separate asset but only when the reimbursement is virtually uncertain.

#### Impairment t)

At each balance sheet date, the company reviews the carrying amounts of its financial assets to determine whether there is any indication that these assets have suffered an impairment loss. Impairment loss occurs where the asset is carried at more than its recoverable amount. An asset is carried at more its recoverable amount if its carrying amount exceeds tha amount to be recovered through use or sale of the asset.

If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount is estimated. An impairment loss is recognized as an expense unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation decrease.

#### CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS 2 (a)

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including experience of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

i) Critical accounting estimates and assumptions:

#### Property, plant and equipment

Critical estimates are made by the directors in determining depreciation rates for property, plant and equipment. The rates used are set out in note 1(e) above.

ii) Critical judgements in applying the entity's accounting principles

In the process of applying the company's accounting policies, management has made judgements in determining:

- The classification of financial assets and leases.
- Whether the assets are impaired.

#### **RISK EXPOSURE** 2 (b)

- The company continues to be negatively affected by increase in inflation and commodity prices while the income (i) remains relatively static due to the Rigid Tarriff approval process However the Management and The Board is actively following up on a Regular Tarriff Review which will ensure a cost recovery Tarrif is in Place. This will mitigate agains rising commodity pricies as well as power costs.
- The catchment area degradition has continued to affect the minimum dry weather flow at the company raw water intake. This means that in the near future te company capacity to abstract 27,000 cubic of water daily may be adversely (ii) affected. However the management and the board are agressively following up the posibility of having an upstream storage by constructing a resouvor or dam.

#### Leased assets

#### 28 FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

The company asses, forecasts as well as identifies risk through its Audit and Risk Mangement Board Committee. However the company is exposed to the following risks:

#### a) Liquidity Risks

This is the risks that the company is unable to meet it's obligations as they fall due as a result of suden and potentially protracted increin cash outflows. These outflows could be principally through increase of general wages through industrial action and court awards,infle nerly pressure, currency depletion or unexpected operatiponal,maitainance costs due to an Act of God eg earthquake, floods or Lands This risk is inherent in any water Company or utility based organisation.

The company manages this risk by properly maitaining stringent cashflow management and adherance to the budgets. A contigency account is in place to mitigate some of the factors. Know Risks have been insured against.

#### b) Operational Risk.

This is arisk attributable to direct impacts resulting from human factors, in adequate or failed internal processes and systems or exteri events. Operational risks are inherent in the Company business activities and are typical of any water Provider.

Losses from operational riks of small significance are expected to occur and are acceptted as part of normal course of service delivery Those of material sigficance are rare and the company seeks to reduce the likelyhood of these.

#### 29 INCORPORATION

The company is incorporated under the Kenyan Companies Act.
